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# Antigua

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# WELCOME

Welcome to Antigua - the Caribbean island with a beach for every day of the year. Take in the soft turquoise blue water, so salty that you can just float on your back and forget the world. Antigua is all about relaxing in the sun, unwinding on the water, and being wined and dined at high-end private resorts. But there is also plenty to do for adventurous travelers looking to get to know the island and its culture. Plan a few days or at least an excursion to Antigua's beautiful sister island Barbuda.





## **Climate & Weather**



You're planning a trip to the Caribbean, so it's pretty safe to assume you already know about the climate. At least: Hot & Sunny. It is the main draw after all, especially for people arriving from the northern hemisphere. But let's get a bit more specific: Antigua has a tropical climate, which means that it's hot and humid throughout the year. Typically, there is a (relatively) cool and dry season, which runs from January to the middle of April. During this period, northeast trade winds are moderate and steady (quite usual for tropical climates). Afterward, there is a transitional period (mid-April to mid-June) with an increase in temperatures and downpours.

From mid-June to mid-November it is hotter, more humid and rainy, and winds are more irregular. Then starts the transition to the dry season, when the northeast winds begin again, and temperatures drop. However, it is important to note, when we say, "temperatures drop," it is not a dramatic decrease. During June (Antigua's hottest month) there is an average temperature of 28°C (82°F) and during the coldest month (January) the average temperature is 25°C (76°F). Either way, delightful vacation temperatures! Year round, the sea is warm enough for swimming, peaking in August with a water temperature of 29°C (84°F).

When is the best time to visit Antigua? That depends on what you are looking for. Many people prefer to visit during the dry, cooler period when there is little chance of a hurricane or cyclone (December-April). Hurricanes are most likely to occur from August to October, which is also "low" tourist season. While many prefer not to travel during these times, if you are looking for a very quiet vacation, with beaches to yourself and lower rates on hotels, this can also be a great time to travel. Just don't expect big parties, as many establishments close down for renovations or have limited opening hours during this period.

While the chance of being caught in a hurricane is still quite low, climate change is making risks more unpredictable. Therefore, if you decide to travel during these months, stay up to date on weather predictions by following a reputable hurricane watch resource such as National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA). You should have good travel insurance and a plan in place to leave (possibly further south) in the case of an approaching hurricane.

## **Geography & Geology**



Antigua & Barbuda is located in the Eastern Caribbean chain with the open Atlantic Ocean to the north and the east. It is further south than the bigger island like the Dominican Republic, Jamaica, and Puerto Rico. As its name suggests, the country is made up of two main islands: Antigua and Barbuda. Antigua, the larger and more populated of the two, lies north of Guadeloupe and northeast of Montserrat. Barbuda is directly north of Antigua and northeast of St. Kitts and Nevis. Locally, Antigua is also known as "Wadadli" and Barbuda as "Wa'omoni." The islands are quite small with Antigua covering an area of 280 sq. km. and Barbuda spanning 160 sq. km. The capital of Antigua and Barbuda is Saint John's. It is located on the island of Antigua in the northwest. In addition to the two main islands, the state also includes the uninhabited island of Redonda, which is a tiny island quite far west of Antigua and just north of Montserrat. There were recently widespread efforts to restore ecology on Redonda and the island is now seeing species come back. Green Island, Guiana Island, Long Island, as well as some islets, are also part of the state and are located just off the coast of Antigua. They are very reachable by boat and many tour operators offer day trips.



The island of Antigua is both volcanic in origin and also consisting of sedimentary limestone rock. It has a jagged coastline, which makes up the hundreds of white sand beaches and bays that Antiqua is famous for. Antiqua is guite low-lying compared to other islands in the chain. Its highest elevation is Mount Obama in the southwest of the island, which has its peak at 1,319 ft. Barbuda is a limestone formation and is very flat. Its highest point only reaches 128 ft. above sea level. Barbuda has a beautiful and large natural lagoon called Codrington, which covers much of the islands western side. It is one of the world's most important nesting sites for frigate birds. Prior to the utter devastation to the island cause my hurricane Irma in 2017, there were an estimated 2,500 nesting pairs in the lagoon. The extent of loss in the colony is still largely unknown.

## **People & Culture**

People in Antigua have that laid-back Caribbean charm. They are friendly and it's easy to strike up a conversation with anyone. The culture is mostly creole with a mix of traditions stemming from Amerindians, West Africa, Europe, and other parts of the Caribbean. The official language of instruction is English. Most people speak a dialect of Creole referred to as Antiguan Creole, which has evolved into a hybrid of British English / and West African languages. Popular music includes soca, calypso, steel drum, and zouk. You're also sure to hear a lot of reggae and dancehall. There is delicious creole and Rastafarian food cooked up at roadside shacks.

### **History**



Today Antigua is a small state belonging to the Commonwealth. It was granted sovereignty in 1981 and became the Antigua & Barbuda of today. But don't let the beautiful scenery and calm seas fool you, Antigua has a violent history. From brutal wars between tribes to slavery on sugar plantations and horrendous working conditions at the shipyards, it wasn't always blue skies for people on Antigua. Social well-being has come far since those days. But many still struggle with the high cost of living, lack of year-round work, and diminishing natural resources.



# ACCOMMODATION

Accommodation in Antigua is dominated by hotels and resorts, many of which are all-inclusive. They are commonly beachfront with beautiful views of the Caribbean Sea. It is quite upscale compared to many other Caribbean destinations, with rooms commonly starting at several hundred per night and increasing from there. Boutique resorts and villas are a great option and range from basic to luxury.

### STARFISH JOLLY BEACH RESORT



The Starfish Jolly Beach Resort is an allinclusive resort situated directly on the sands of one of Antigua's most beautiful powdery white sand beaches. The water is light turguoise and delightful to float around in. The resort features several different restaurants including an all-youcan-eat buffet, a by-reservation Italian restaurant and their poolside Coconut Grill. There are also several open-bars, day and night entertainment. two pools (one quiet, and one lively with music), water sports and tennis courts. You won't find a better deal, with all-inclusive packages starting at USD 110 per day in low season. Wifi is included in common areas and can be accessed in rooms for a fee. Even with everything at your fingertips, we highly recommend renting a car for a few days to explore the island or participating in an island tour. At the resort they have a stand where you can book tours directly.

### NORTHSHORE APARTHOTEL

With every room facing out onto the ocean, it's hard to go wrong with this simple and charming hotel. It is located on the very northern tip of the island on Hodges Bay. The beach is small, quiet, and perfect for relaxing. The hotel is made up of 30 apartments, all of which have their own patio or balcony. Each unit has a bedroom with a king or twin bed, a pull-out couch in the living room, and a kitchenette. It's a good option for couples, families, or single travelers who prefer to be a little further away from busy tourist attractions and explore the island on their own terms, while still having oceanfront at an affordable price. We recommend a rental car to get around. It is only a short drive to the airport, so a solid option for transit days. Average rates for standard rooms are USD 160-200, but you can usually get a discount during low season. Alternative rates for long-term rental are also possible.

### PAPA ZOUK

Preferred not to be called a restaurant by the owner, this casual "Rum Shop" is a real treasure. Not scarce of good reviews, with Robert de Niro stating it's one of his favorite places to eat in Antigua and another traveler writing, "I would fly back to Antigua, just to eat at Papa Zouk again." Previously famous around the Caribbean for housing the most diverse selection of rum, in 2014 a fire burned Papa Zouk to the ground. The owner thought that would be the end until donations from quests who cherished the place started pouring in. Now, this legendary pub is once again buzzing with the sound of laughter, clashing cocktails, the beat of zouk music, and the smell of the island's most delicious seafood prepared to perfection every time. The menu is small with just a handful of seafood dishes (if you don't eat fish, they can usually prepare something else, but best to call in advance or just go for the rum). Speaking of which, while supplies last, have a taste of the signature "Fire Rum - the most unique rum blend in the world" - a blend of all the salvageable rums that survived the blaze mixed into one big barrel. Prices are not cheap, but also not high end you can dine like a king with multiple courses and rum cocktails for around EC 150 p/p. (less if you order less). Papa Zouk is open Mon. - Sat. 7:00 pm - 12:00 am / Closed Sun.
